## What are the Components of an Eye Examination?

In the FEP BlueVision® program, participants are entitled to an annual comprehensive eye health examination with a participating provider. Components of a comprehensive examination include the following:

- Case History – Chief Complaint, Eye and Vision History, Medical History
- Entrance Distance Acuities
- Internal Ocular Examination (Dilated Fundus Evaluation)
- External Ocular Evaluation (Slit Lamp Examination)
- Tonometry
- Distance Refraction – Objective and Subjective
- Binocular Coordination and Ocular Motility Evaluation
- Evaluation of Pupillary Function
- Biomicroscopy
- Gross Visual Fields
- Assessment and Plan
- Patient Education
- Form Completion – School, Motor Vehicle, etc.

Standards of care have been established for all aspects of the program, including eye examinations. These standards are entirely consistent with those established by State Departments of Health and include preventive eye care with glaucoma testing, refractive care and the prescribing of eyeglasses.

A key ophthalmologic measure included in HEDIS standards, Dilated Fundus Evaluation (DFE) is universally recognized as a critical diagnostic procedure in the detection and management of these conditions. These examinations will lead to higher quality patient care, improved lifestyle through early intervention, and lower overall health care costs while achieving a higher level of compliance with HEDIS requirements.
